Passover Food Drive

The 39th Annual Passover Food Drive was a great success! Faced with COVID-19 restrictions, we were determined to assist the thousands in the community who rely on our help. The need was even greater and we are proud to have provided **2,100 boxes of Kosher for Passover food to families in the GTA.** We are grateful to UJA Federation who assisted with the logistics and deliveries.

A new initiative, Matzah Mountain, engaged students in a fun way to help raise funds and awareness of this vital project. Many public schools and Hebrew Day Schools enthusiastically participated.

There was an outpouring of appreciation from recipients whose Passover boxes had a meaningful impact in their lives and helped them to enjoy a happy holiday. We acknowledge and thank our generous donors, sponsors, schools and stores that helped support this project again this year.



Project LISA

With the rise of isolation comes an increase in domestic violence. Project LISA has been there for women since the outbreak of the pandemic. As in most of society, COVID-19 has brought a shift in the manner by which we run our program. Project LISA was able to seamlessly pivot its traditional working space, from one conducted in an office, to that of a remote working environment where clients have remained connected with our support and partner agencies through social media platforms, phone and internet.

We partnered with Teaching Awareness Through Puppetry to provide children of clients the opportunity to learn together about positive relationships. The workshop produced engaged participation.

Human Trafficking

Our Committee had a very productive year despite the lockdown. We are proud to have created a PowerPoint presentation entitled NOT IN MY FAMILY that speaks of the risks of Human Sex Trafficking to children of all socioeconomic levels. It brings an awareness of this heinous activity to parents who think their children could never be victimized. The presentation quotes myths and statistics, and most importantly gives very important information on how parents can detect any issues and what to do if they suspect victimization of their children. We will approach synagogues, parent associations and other organizations, as well as each of our Sections across Canada to avail them of our presentation.



L'Chaim continued to move forward this year with virtual social and educational programs. Our programs are intended to address the social, emotional and educational needs of our clients. This included virtual teas, meditation and stretching, scarf tying, and cooking demonstrations, talks on guided imagery, journaling and intimacy after cancer. Sponsorship of any program, perhaps in honour or memory of a loved one, is encouraged. We use these funds to offset the costs of the excellent speakers we had.

Another fundraising project we created this year is Meaningful Milestones. Artist Laya Crust has generously donated her talent to create gorgeous cards for L'Chaim. This year's Turning the Page Children's Library Project, La Maison's Francophone Shelter was a true accomplishment! Because of the pandemic, all arrangements were made virtually. Everything was delivered to the shelter by Shelter Movers. Our artist respected the protocols and created a delightful mural. The children and staff were thrilled with the beautiful space.

Nellie's Shelter, which was our first library completed, is moving into a new location. We look forward to working with them again to fulfill their request to create another children's library in their new space.

Toronto Jewish Quilting Project

Despite the evident challenges, the Quilting group was able to accomplish much this year. Twelve magnificent quilts were gifted to recipients who were going through treatment for cancer.

The new Pot Holder Project proved to be a great project for members to make on their own at home. The goal of making 2,000 in order to go into each Passover Food Drive box in 2022 was extremely ambitious. Therefore, some Branches participated by learning how to make these mini quilts to help with the numbers. The most exciting positive consequence of the pandemic was reaching out to students who desperately needed volunteer hours. Eva Karpati taught five groups of 10 students how to sew these potholders through 9 hour online sessions. They gained a new skill, gave back to the community and learned about the work of NCJWC Toronto. One of the schools, CHAT gave a wonderful acknowledgment in their newsletter. A few students expressed an interest in starting a Club at their school in the Fall. Presently there are 400 pot holders made.

Teaching Awareness through Puppetry (TAP)

It has been a challenging school year with staff and teachers moving back and forth between in-person and virtual learning as we all tried to navigate the challenges of the pandemic. Our virtual workshops have been in high demand. We have delivered 47 workshops to over 1000 students. Conversations with students about mental health, friendship strategies and accepting differences are more important than ever as young children struggle with the isolation and uncertainty of their world. Our puppets have helped us have thoughtful conversations with students virtually in their classrooms, or online schooling in their homes.

In addition to our ongoing programming, TAP and NCJWC Toronto collaborated on three special projects through social media and throughout the community. We created a video with Laura Berkley talking about Chanukah and Passover. In April, in partnership with Project LISA, we ran our Lisasaurus Rex workshop for families and children. It was a great success and we learned together about the importance of positive relationships and getting help when you need it. Just for Me Backpack

Like so many other aspects of life in 2020, the Just For Me Backpack Project needed to pivot given COVID-19 restrictions. We typically pack the backpacks in July in anticipation of kids going back to school. This past fall, there was so much uncertainty around what "back to school" would look like that JF&CS, the agency through whom we provide the backpacks, asked us not to provide physical goods. Instead, the agency requested gift cards to enable families to purchase school supplies they deemed would be most helpful for their children facing the potential of more online schooling. The agency was very grateful that the gift cards could be distributed without any client interaction.

We are hopeful this summer will bring better news as more and more people are vaccinated and we will be able to resume our typical backpack project.

Bathurst Prince Charles Foundation

This past year has been very difficult financially due to our aging building and unforeseen circumstances. Maintenance has included boiler and plumbing issues, replacement of entrance security system, reconstruction of walkway entrances, and renovations to many tenant units as they have become vacant.

Under Alan Alexander's leadership as Property Manager strict adherence to COVID-19 protocols were maintained. Regularly scheduled recreational activities for tenants were suspended. However, staff ingenuity ensured that holiday celebrations continued. A BBQ was held in August - food was barbequed on site and delivered to each tenant unit. In December, Orah Branch provided gifts for the children and for each tenant unit, which staff delivered. Passover Food boxes were also delivered to 70 tenants.

In April, Management, PACE staff and Sunnybrook hospital organized a vaccine clinic for tenants. Alan Alexander, Lena Gabriel, Harry Hagopian and Dan Donnell did an exemplary job taking care of registration and set up, exhibiting their continued pride and dedication to the residents in our building.

In spite of the challenges of social distancing, lockdowns and travel restrictions, technology has enabled the women of NCJW Canada to connect, collaborate and create. This past year has been filled with the planning and execution of exciting and dynamic national programming. This included the Women and Justice Webinar Series culminating with Anat Hoffman who spoke from Israel about her women's rights organization, Women of the Wall.

An important advocacy initiative was our webinar featuring the documentary Nasrin, followed by a panel discussion about the human rights activist, Nasrin Sotoudeh, from Iran. We continue to press for her release in tandem with the Raoul Wallenberg Centre in Montreal.

NCJWC not only continues its valued relationship with ICJW; but has now also become involved with the new Commonwealth Jewish Network, connecting Jewish women leaders from more than 30 commonwealth nations. The pandemic has brought the five NCJWC Sections closer. The establishment of a Presidents' Council, provides a platform to share ideas, programs, successes and failures.

The staff from our Israel project, ALUMA (IFCA) gave an important virtual presentation to the membership highlighting the important work they do. This demonstrated the value of our yearly monetary contribution to this unique counselling centre and the on-going need for our financial aid.

Thus, our national organization continues to thrive. We are proud of the resilience of our national and international organization and look forward to continued good work in the future.
