NCJWC Toronto Accomplishments at a Glance

In the face of the pandemic, we are proud that NCJWC Toronto has continued to thrive. We have settled into our beautiful new home, hired a new Executive Director, pivoted to wonderful zoom programs in response to the needs of our members continued with ongoing projects and launched new ones. These are a few highlights:

- ▶ Our **AGM** was held on November 18/21 virtually. Geriatrician Dr. Nathan M. Stall, spoke about the challenges facing older adults with the complexity of COVID combined with other health issues they face including dementia.
- On Sunday, November 21/21, NCJWC Toronto hosted its very first Mitzvah Day and prompted our members to action. We made sandwiches for the homeless, collected and filled purses containing essentials for women in shelters, and donated bags of clothes, coats and boots for Ve'ahavta clients. The Mitzvah Knitters donated bags of knitted blankets. Toys and gift cards were also donated for the JF&CS Annual Chanukah Drive for Dreidels.
- ▶ The L'Chaim Committee— NCJWC Toronto's Cancer support program- chaired by Susan Austin and Irene Papernick, established a new partnership with Wellspring. Wellspring will train volunteers to be Peer Support Mentors for cancer patients and caregivers of individuals diagnosed with cancer and their loved ones.
- NCJWC Toronto's Program Committee, chaired by Ena Cord and Bev Hutner, launched a Zoom program series:
 - On March 28/22 Dr. Paula Rochon, Director, Women's Age Lab, Women's College Hospital talked about Healthy Aging.
 - On April 4/22 a virtual Lunch & Learn interviewed expert Jeremy Otto about the fundamentals of social media, hosted by our President Sheila Neuburger.
 - On May 17/22 we hosted our final virtual Lunch & Learn featuring Shani Azulai, Deputy Consul General, Consulate of Israel for Toronto and Western Canada, who provided us with an Israel Update.
- April 2022 featured the 39th annual **NCJWC Toronto Passover Food Drive**, chaired by Shelly Feldman and Susan Glickman. Our volunteers ensured the distribution of 2200 boxes of Passover food to the most vulnerable in our community. Over \$200,000 was raised to cover the costs of this vital program. In spite of the Covid-related logistical challenges of food distribution, we are stronger than ever. We are already planning for next year which marks the 40th anniversary of the Passover Food Drive.
- ▶ One Voice, chaired by Eva Karpati completed its toolkit for faith leaders to better support victims of domestic violence.
- ▶ Teaching Awareness through Puppetry (TAP), chaired by Laura Berkley, continues to thrive and work to educate children and help to create kinder, more inclusive communities. For the past year, TAP has adapted to the changing environment and offered virtual workshops. The use of technology and high demand enabled TAP to deliver 100 workshops, reaching over 1300 students in the GTA (an over 50% increase since last year).
- ► The **Toronto Jewish Quilting Project**, quilted 1000 beautiful potholders, which were distributed in the Passover Food boxes. This longstanding quilting group has begun to again meet regularly at Council House on Wednesday afternoons, making beautiful quilts for cancer patients referred by L'Chaim and community members.
- ▶ During May's **Jewish Heritage Month** celebrations, NCJWC Toronto featured a daily post on social medial celebrating the accomplishments of Canadian Jewish women.
- NCJWC Toronto's Human Trafficking Awareness Committee, chaired by Ena Cord, hosted a workshop "Open Your Eyes: How to Talk to your Children about Human Sex Trafficking" with over 70 participants, on May 3rd. In addition, Ena Cord and Eva Karpati have been invited to present at the 19th Annual International Human Trafficking and Social Justice Conference in August, 2022 on zoom.
- ▶ NCJWC Toronto launched KICKOFF TO CAMP 2022 in May. Thanks to the generosity of our members and branches, we successfully raised \$15,000 to ensure that 207 underprivileged children being subsidized to attend camp this summer through JF&CS will be able to buy a new pair of sneakers or other camp necessities. A presentation ceremony to JF&CS took place on June 7/22. Thank you to Miles Nadal and Family for their generous lead gift!
- ▶ NCJWC TORONTO will be launching a new pilot project this summer in partnership with the Betel Centre to address social isolation of our seniors. This project will match volunteers from NCJWC with Betel Centre members who have asked for a buddy. If you wish to participate or for more information, please contact our office.

Chai Branch is still meeting on a regular basis on Zoom. This past year on Zoom, Thornhill Study Group was able to enjoy a sense of camaraderie and belonging. Programs organized by the committee, headed by Judy Weinryb, started with Ori Dagan, a Toronto jazz singer and composer in an all-Gershwin concert and included two authors talks: Author, Ann Dublin, who discussed her book: Jacob, and the Mandolin Adventure and Carol Borgh, the daughter of Kindertransport survivors talked about "Reflections on the Kindertransport: Rescuing Children from pre-War Europe". Two programs were also held about the Jews of Iceland and Alaska and a book review from two of our members. In order to addres shrinking membership, Thornhill Study Group is exploring alternatives such as merging with another group fully or just for programming.
